## BUYER TIPS: Negotiating the Purchase!

When it comes to buying and selling, the buyer wants a good deal and the seller wants to sell it for a good price. Here are a few tips to help you meet in the middle and walk away with a smile:

TIP #1 | Get it inspected! I know, you're saying of course an RV Inspector would say that! It really is a valuable tool that helps you know the true condition of the RV and therefore it's potential value.

TIP #2 | Know the NADA Value of the RV before vou make an offer. The National Automotive Dealers Association [NADA] has a website that will give you a lowmid-high range on the value of any vehicle. If the RV has a diesel engine, the value is not affected by the mileage. If it has a gas engine, you will want to enter the mileage of the RV because this can greatly affect the value. Once you know the high and low value the RV should sell for, you will be more prepared to make a reasonable offer. Visit NADA.COM to get

TIP #3 | Have Your Financing in Place. In other words, if you're planning on financing your new RV, then get preapproved by the lender of your choice. Check interest rates with various lenders too! Keep in mind that the older the RV, the harder they are to finance. RV financing is much different than buying a car. Now-a-days most car loans have a term of 6 to 7 years, less if older. With RV's, the financing term could be as much as 20 years on a newer RV. Financing a RV is more like buying a house than a car. In a seller's market, being preapproved can make the difference when there is more than one potential buyer.

TIP #4 | Know When to Walk Away. Decide ahead of time what your 'no goes' are. It's very easy to get emotionally attached to purchasing an RV. Determining your 'no goes' ahead of time keeps you from making an emotional decision that you'll possibly regret later.

- 3. Don't buy every RV gadget you find. It's easy when you're new to RVing to think you need a bunch of special gear. Most of what you need, you probably already have at home. Spend some time using your RV, then decide what to purchase.
- 4. Always use a surge protector when connecting to power at an RV park. So, there are a few extremely necessary items that you'll need for your RV [if it didn't come with them]. A surge protector is one of those items. RV park electricity varies drastically. Protecting your RV from power surges is very important. Power surges can do a great deal of damage to an RV, so please don't skip this one.
- 5. Use a TPMS [Tire Pressure Monitoring System]. This is another super important item. Not only can a blowout be dangerous, they can also do serious damage to an RV. There a many styles & types of systems available.
- 6. Read the manuals that came with your RV. 99% of the RV's we've inspected had the original manuals. The systems on a RV can be complicated. Look thru your manuals and learn how to use things before you go camping for the first time. Also, keep the manuals in the RV for future reference.
- 7. Try not to travel at night.

  you're not super familiar
  with can make for
  stressful moments.
- 8. Have fun! After all, isn't this why you bought an RV in the first place?
